Note: "ti" as in "Kai ti" means "style" or "font." Among these fonts, "Song" is the most commonly used printing font. Almost all Chinese books printed in Mainland China use "Song ti."



Chinese Character Dictionary (Lit. China Big/'Great' Character Dictionary)

(There are two types of Chinese dictionaries. One is the character dictionary, like the one above, which focuses on the details of individual characters. There are also word dictionaries, which focus on words [often made of more than one character] and their meanings.)

sūn zǐ bīng fǎ 孙子兵法

The Art of War (lit. Sun Zi military method)

(The Art of War is an ancient Chinese military treatise attributed to Sun Zi. It has had a deep influence on Eastern and Western society. 'Zi' as in 'Sun Zi' used to be a respectful title in ancient China for knowledgeable or virtuous noble men. It doesn't mean 'son' here.)

shí sān suì **shàng** qīng huá bù **zi tài dà le** 十三(13)岁 上 清华, 步子太大了

Going to Tsinghua (university) at 13 years old, he took a huge step.

(The picture shows a child prodigy named Fàn Shūkǎi who started attending Tsinghua, one of the very best and elite universities in China, at only 13 years old in 2013. The "child prodigy" topic used to be very controversial in China. A prodigy program was first set up at the University of Science and Technology of China [USTC] in 1978.)
